Jovita Idár was a fearless advocate for Mexican-American rights at a time of intense discrimination along the Texas-Mexico border.

As a journalist, she used the power of the press to confront injustice, writing boldly about racism, education inequality, and women's suffrage. She helped organize the First Mexican Congress in 1911 and was active in the League of Mexican Women, promoting education for girls.

Idár's commitment to civil rights, combined with her refusal to be silenced, continues to inspire generations of journalists and activists


### JIAMOND BAR WOMAN'S CLUB 3rd Vice President

## HISTORY IS NOT WHAT HAPPENS. HISTORY IS WHAT WE TEACH

For most of time history is written by the men in power and is focused on what men did in war, politics, diplomacy, and government. What is valued by men determines what is historically important. If a woman played any part, the history that is taught often eliminates our contribution or describes it within the sex stereotypical roles of wives, mothers, daughters, and mistresses. Taught history often minimizes or ignores the contributions of women and efforts to correct the record are called historical revisionism rather than "truth."

One way that gives people confidence and enables them to strive to contribute comes from the perspective we gain when studying who did what in the past. Limiting what is taught about the contributions of women to our society gives the impression to our young women that making your mark is too difficult and won't be valued anyway. It also gives support to our young men in any belief they may have that they are the only ones who can do great things.

Some key moments in women's history include the <u>suffrage movement</u>, which fought for women's right to vote; the feminist movement of the 1960s and 1970s, which brought attention to issues such as reproductive rights and workplace discrimination; and the <u>#MeToo movement</u>, which has drawn attention to the prevalence of sexual harassment and assault. In those movements that supported our ability to be respected as valued and contributing members of society success came from the cooperation among unrelated women working together for their common good.

Are you on a school board? Do you participate in school related parent organizations? Can you talk to those who are on a board or in parent organizations? Saying yes to any of those questions means you have the power to impact what is taught. That means you can influence what history says and what will happen in the future.

All of us are role models for our families, our Club sisters, and our communities. Our efforts can include being a part of what is taught in our schools and behavior that reinforces the valuable lesson that cooperation and support among women is the only way to ensure we will ever have equal rights, privileges, and power.

Maral V. Karaccusian Named Interim Director of L.A. County's Aging & Disabilities Department

Maral Karaccusian, MSW, has been appointed Interim Director of the Los Angeles County Aging & Disabilities Department (AD) following the retirement of Dr. Laura Trejo.

In her new role, Karaccusian will oversee one of the largest and most comprehensive aging and disability service networks in the country — including Adult Protective Services (APS), the Area Agency on Aging (AAA), thirteen Community and Senior Centers, and two advisory commissions: the Los Angeles County Commission for Older Adults (LACCOA) and the Los Angeles County Commission on Disabilities (LACCOD).

The department plays a vital role in supporting older adults and people with disabilities across the County, ensuring access to essential services, resources, and community-based programs that promote independence, dignity, and inclusion.

Karaccusian brings more than 20 years of experience in social work, human services, and public policy to the position. Her work has focused on improving outcomes for some of the County's most vulnerable populations — including older adults, people with disabilities,
