

A very special thank you to our last months guest speaker, Patrick Byrne, Director at ASYMCA 29-Palms Marine Base. He distributed information about the programs run at the base, and provided the organizations annual yearbook. Members were allowed an opportunity

to address and ask questions. Here's what we learned: ASYMCA is an affiliate of the big YMCA Organization, which they are gifted an \$160K allowance and 10% is the offset of this allowance to run their organization at 29-Palms. They are allowed to fundraise to keep all

programs going and willingly accept donations from outside organizations and individuals. They have in place a Structured Sustainability Program. This was wonderful to hear, how it helps to support programs and strategies of the organization.

Now, to address many of our question; Patrick did state; that they do not take 10% of the Making Spirits Bright donations, and that all funds incoming are distributed and designated as indicated. For example: The Wish List of Making Spirits Bright are items of "In-Kind Donations" toys, clothing and footwear. If a Gift Card is donated that is a CASH-Donation that is categorized directly, the IRS considers it cash. Just as we donated \$22,000 for their programs which allows the Diamond Bar Woman's Club to file this information on our 990-Annual Income Taxes. 29-Palms would also be required to account for this large donation as a 501 (c) (3) organization. I trust this will clear-up some of the confusion, "Nothing is Free in circulation of a monetary donation."

AGING TIPS & INFO

METFORMIN CAN SLOW AGING AND EXTEND LIFE SPAN

Metformin is the mostly widely prescribed drug in the world to treat type 2 diabetes. It's been around for 60 years and is generally safe for most people.

It may also be a key to slow aging, mitigate age-related diseases, extend lifespan and increase health span. All in a pill that costs pennies a day, is safe, and has been scientifically shown to impact age-related biological changes.

It's not exactly clear just how metformin affects aging, but researchers think it acts on several different hallmarks of aging—changes at the cellular, chromosomal and molecular levels which accumulate over time.

These transformations are what can lead to onset of conditions like heart disease, diabetes, some cancers, or dementia, often known as "diseases of aging."

Many studies show that metformin targets these age-related cell changes - observational studies not as rigorous as clinical trials.

The result: Not only does it help control type 2 diabetes, but over time, people with diabetes taking the drug had lower death rates, better health, and longer lives compared with both diabetic and non-diabetics not taking metformin.

Metformin also has anti-inflammatory effects, which may contribute to its ability to slow aging.

Chronic inflammation is one hallmark of aging and age-related diseases, reducing inflammation can improve health and life span.

Metformin takes an old cell or an old organ and fixes a lot of things.

It has a domino effect; if you target one hallmark, it will affect the others.

Why Treat Aging

After about age 60, many of us start to accumulate age-related diseases like heart disease, diabetes, many forms of cancer, and dementia.

Additionally, as people age, they're more likely to have several conditions at the same time.

Researchers believe it's the biology of aging that drives these diseases, so preventing them means slowing down the aging process itself.

The goal is to help people not only live longer, but live with less disease, resulting in greater health span—the period of time spent free from disabling disease.

By targeting aging itself, and mitigating changes at the cellular level, we could treat or prevent all of these conditions together.

Metformin - derived from Galega Officinalis herb, has been used for centuries to treat numerous ailments - including diabetes.

Galega contains guanidine, which, in 1918, was shown to lower blood glucose.

Metformin, a synthesized version of guanidine, was first used as a diabetes treatment in France in the 1950s and was finally approved in the U.S. in 1995.

More than 150 million people worldwide currently use the drug to manage their type 2 diabetes.

Metformin is also taken "off-label" for conditions including prediabetes, polycystic ovary syndrome, and weight gain from other medications, as well as for its apparent anti-aging benefits - some in the scientific community remain unconvinced.

Metformin side effects and risks

.....

Metformin has as good a safety profile as virtually any drug you can find.

Any side effects from metformin are generally mild, and usually consist of gastrointestinal upset and vitamin B-12 deficiency.

For people beginning to experience the maladies of aging, there's a lot of observational evidence Metformin is good for you.

Should you take metformin for longevity?

Metformin is not currently approved as an anti-aging treatment.

While some doctors may be willing to prescribe it off-label, it's best to speak with your health care provider about the risks versus any potential benefits.



Let's Talk Public Safety

DBWC Safety Chair - Raphael H. Plunkett



Public safety is an important goal for many communities. The City of Diamond makes a concerted effort to inform, empower and educate its community about safety. As promised, I attended the City of Diamond Bar Public Safety Seminar on Feb. 28 at Diamond Point Elementary School. There were representatives from LA County Fire, Sheriff and City Staff. Assistant City Manager Ryan McLean lead the presentation, along with Deputy Aaron Scheller, Acting Assistant Fire Chief Dustin Robertson and Assistant to the City Manager Anthony Santos. There were information tables along with an opportunity to perform hands only CPR. Light refreshments were available.

The planned 90 minute meeting, went to almost two hours as there were questions and discussion that accompanied the projected presentation and color handouts. Deputy Scheller quoted a previous Chief, "Diamond Bar is a low crime community, not a no crime community." While our community is safer than others, we still have issues to contend with. Our violent crimes are low , with property crimes accounting for 90% of all crimes.

Our City moves to eliminate crime in all areas, as well as addressing other needs, including animal care and control, fire protection and emergency medical services, emergency preparedness, school crossing guards, and homelessness response and resources.

Residents learned about these things along with situational awareness and personal safety, wildfire preparedness and home fire prevention. We learned that Diamond Bar spends more than 25% of its General Fund budget on public safety.

Of the 60,000 residents in Diamond Bar, there were 22 residents in attendance and Deputy Scheller noted his hope that the next sessions would have many more in attendance.
