The fundamentals of the project are presented with a budget, if it requires any club funding and or will generate income to support the project in full details for 1-year. Thereafter, the year the club votes again to adopt and/or fails the project. It is important that the committee keeps good records to report on the progress of the project and allows an opportunity of bragging writes throughout the year. This information is submitted to the Club Dean who moved the Club reports forward to the SGVD-San Gabriel Valley District for judging in categories and club size. All reports are moved forward to the CFWC-California Federation of Women's Clubs, and also GFWC. All club awards and certificates are presented at the local District 68th Annual Convention. If you are lucky enough to receive a state recognition it's presented at the State CFWC Annual Convention.

A "Program" Report – There are (14) assorted Programs listed in the SGVD Yearbook that has committee chairman assigned to each program. All clubs within the San Gabriel Valley District are encouraged to participate in each area. After all many of us are already a participant and we don't even know it. Example: If you attended the Membership Workshop or Leadership Workshop and brought back information to your club there is a report just waiting to be written in two different program areas. These reports are also judged and Awarded Certificates are presented at convention.

I trust this information will become helpful in the future as a Diamond Bar Woman's Club dues paying member. Remember you're a Board Member of the San Gabriel Valley District and can attend any District Business Board Meeting.

This year MSB had a busy year starting with the month of September requesting wish lists from both Marine Bases, so some of our Participating partners could start their shopping early. Working with my assistant at the 29 Palms Base it worked out beautifully even with the new program. The committee had also been very busy with Fundraising to make our goal of providing 150 families with gifts for Camp Pendleton and the 29 Palms Marine Base. MSB Committee also participated with our community partners with Food Donations to benefit the 29 Palms Marine Base. Two Food donations had been delivered totaling over six tons of food diapers, baby items and hygiene products. We also had two Women's Clubs join our program with purchasing gifts for our military families.

This was such a great help purchasing and wrapping gifts for so many families. Our Marine Dinner in November was a Success. The event had sold out and Senator Bob Archuleta presented an acknowledgement to our special guest Goldstar family who lost their 19 year old son in combat.

Also, another sister received a recognition from the Senator for her brother's loss also due to combat. Senator Archuleta also presented the MSB committee with a beautiful Certificate. We also received a check in the amount of \$5,000 which was so badly needed to fund our program. The toy drive generated over 2400 toys for the 29 Palms Marine Base. Senator Josh Newman also raised toys for the Country Estates which will be delivered after New Years. Our Partner the Evangelical Free (EFree) Church in Diamond Bar hosted the yearly gift wrapping party and many volunteers showed up to lend their gift wrapping talent. We had good food and music for our volunteers. Many enjoyed the camaraderie with people they never met before. This year all our gifts and donations have been delivered to the base by Valle Vista. A big thank you to this company for donating the truck, driver and helper to help us load the gifts. I delivered a check in the amount of \$5,000 to Camp Pendleton on behalf of MSB. We Handed out the gifts to military families had been attended by seven people. We took three vehicles since we had gifts and donations to take with us.

The families had been overjoyed receiving their gifts and it was heartwarming to see how appreciative everyone had been who was picking up their gifts. The children looked for the candy canes on the tree and some of us had been eager to help them reach for them. We also enjoyed lunch with the marines to learn where everyone was coming from. One marine arrived from Guam for training. MSB also delivered a check in the amount of \$10,000 for the family emergency program at the base. Our helping elfs which was total of 15 marines that received a gift card in the amount of \$25.


Overall, this was a great year for Making Spirits Bright and I would like to thank the great committee for their hard work throughout this year making the program such a success.

Avocados contain about 1 gram of saturated fat, heart-healthy monounsaturated fats, plenty of potassium and a little sodium – if any. They're also a <u>rich source of fiber</u>, with just half of an avocado providing up to 20% of your daily recommended intake.

Fats are the most energy-dense macronutrient,

containing nine calories per gram, compared to four calories per gram for carbohydrates and protein.

A typical medium-sized avocado (150 grams) contains around 240 calories.

These calories come packed with nutritional benefits, including healthy monounsaturated fats, vitamins, minerals, and fiber that keep you satiated and boost overall health.

One avocado contains 10 grams of fiber and three grams of protein!


ARE THEY BENEFICIAL FOR WEIGHT LOSS?

JANUARY WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

AURORA CASTILL

As a fourth-generation Mexican-American, Aurora Castillo was the force behind an organization known as the Mothers of East Los Angeles. Aurora Castillo and the Mothers of East Los Angeles successfully defended East L.A. from serious environmental and public health threats. In 1984, Aurora Castillo worked against the building of what would have been the eighth prison in this predominantly Latino community. Castillo met with two other women to oppose the new prison, and the Mothers of East Los Angeles (MELA) was born. The group organized a huge march in protest. They flooded hearings, demanded public meetings in Spanish and became informed about environmental issues beyond their immediate community. When MELA learned that the Santa Barbara oil pipeline was scheduled to run through their community, they played a decisive role in stopping it. The prison controversy raged on until 1992 when the state finally decided to relocate the jail to a city that wanted it.





March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election

- The last day to register to vote for the <u>March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary</u>
 <u>Election</u> is February 20, 2024.
- All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election.
- Your county elections office will begin mailing ballots by February 5, 2024.
- Ballot drop-off locations open on February 6, 2024.
- Vote-by-mail ballots can be returned by mail, at a drop-off location, or your county elections office.
- Vote centers open for early in-person voting in all Voter's Choice Act counties beginning on February 24, 2024.
- Vote-by-mail ballots must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by March 12, 2024.

When I started patrolling Diamond Bar more than 16 years ago, I started to see a trend. Every year, during the holidays or on days of major sporting events, I would respond to more domestic violence calls. Not surprisingly, most of the calls involved alcohol or drug use.

I say it is not surprising because alcohol and drugs are neurotoxins that affect the brain and body, resulting in poor judgement, volatile moods, impulsive actions, and other negative outcomes. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that roughly 55% of domestic abuse perpetrators were drinking alcohol prior to assault. And according to the American Psychological Association, excessive drug or alcohol use increases the risk of being a victim of domestic violence — and of becoming an abuser.

We are nearing the end of the 2023 holiday season but 2024 will be filled with major sports events, including Super Bowl Sunday, which is considered one of the biggest drinking days of the year. According to statistics, drunk driving incidents increase by approximately 22% on game day. And more alcohol-related accidents and DUI-related injuries occur on Super Bowl Sunday than on any other day of the year, aside from New Year's Eve.

As they do every year, law enforcement agencies nationwide will be on high alert for drunk or impaired drivers, and you can expect to see extra patrols and sobriety checkpoints at pre-approved locations. I should add that driving under the influence

(DUI) can be issued if you are caught driving under the influence of, or impaired, by any type of drug – not just alcohol. This includes marijuana, prescription drugs and some over-the-counter medications.

Whether you will be spending the New Year's holiday or watching the Super Bowl game at home, or at a larger gathering, there are ways to prevent disagreements from potentially becoming physical altercations. These include changing the subject or the activity, responding with kindness.
